Content:	<p>The committee completed the following actions to work towards fulfilling its mandate:</p> <p>PASSA Work Plan Administration provided an update on the PASSA Work Plan status. It will be provided to Trustees for review and input at a future meeting.</p> <p>Summer Learning Update, 2024 Associate Director Canham and Superintendents Auckland, Baker, Bruce and Giannacopoulos provided an update on the learning opportunities that were available to Thames Valley District School (TVDSB) students during the summer of 2024.</p> <p>Administration sought input from the committee regarding considerations for the development of the 2025 program.</p> <p>The committee expressed appreciation to Administration for creating the summer learning opportunities.</p> <p>Summer Mental Health and Well-Being Supports Superintendent Bruce and Manager Lambert provided an update on the mental health and well-being supports that were available for TVDSB students during 2024 July and August.</p>

	<p>It was noted that TVDSB offered several mental health supports throughout the summer months ranging from Tier 1 supports for elementary and secondary summer school programs, to Tier 3 one-on-one mental health counselling sessions. In addition, the TVDSB partnered with the London District Catholic School Board and EarlyOn Child and Family Centres to offer ‘pop-up’ developmental screening clinics across the district.</p> <p>Administration requested input from the committee regarding considerations for the development of the 2025 summer program.</p> <p>It was noted that a report regarding measures for next year summer mental health and well-being, Ministry of Education funding, and the alignment of the MYSP to summer mental health and well-being will be provided at a future meeting.</p> <p>The committee expressed appreciation to Administration for making well-being opportunities available to students.</p> <p>EQAO Results for 2023-24 Associate Director Canham, Superintendent Builder and Manager Stager presented an overview of the 2023—24 Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) results for TVDSB and the province for information.</p> <p>Administration provided and reviewed a handout of the 2023-2024 TVDSB EQAO Assessment Results.</p> <p>Administration committed to reviewing and reporting on the system’s strategy to increase EQAO results and decrease gaps across all departments in the board at a future meeting.</p> <p>Questions and Comments by Members</p> <p>Student Trustees were acknowledged for their contributions during the meeting.</p> <p>Vice Chair Smith thanked staff for their hard work preparing and during the meeting.</p>

CHANGES TO THE ASSESSMENT

- In 2021-2022 EQAO moved to multi-stage computer adaptive testing (msCAT)

What does this mean?

- Assessments delivered online
- Test adapts to a student's level of proficiency
- Items delivered in sets or “modules”
- Students begin with a Stage 1 module of medium difficulty questions
- Depending on how well students do in Stage 1 they will move on to one of three possible modules in Stage 2 of varying difficulty

WHAT DO THESE CHANGES MEAN?

- As opposed to Linear Tests students complete different versions of the test
- Different psychometric and statistical models are then used to score the results
- Makes use of Machine Learning algorithms and multidimensional item response theory (MIRT) which results in higher measurement efficiency than CAT (computer adaptive testing)
- Historically provided with individual item responses for each student (IIRs). We would compile and create percent correct at each skill and strand level at school or board level
- This data is now pre-calculated for us at the school and board levels for math assessments as strand and skills reports. Can be tracked across time starting in 2021-22

COMPARISONS TO PAST RESULTS

- EQAO has told us that **comparisons to results prior to 2021-22 should be avoided**
- We have provided trends for the last 3 years
- Prior to 2021-22 results were based on ALL students;
Results now are now based on PARTICIPATING students

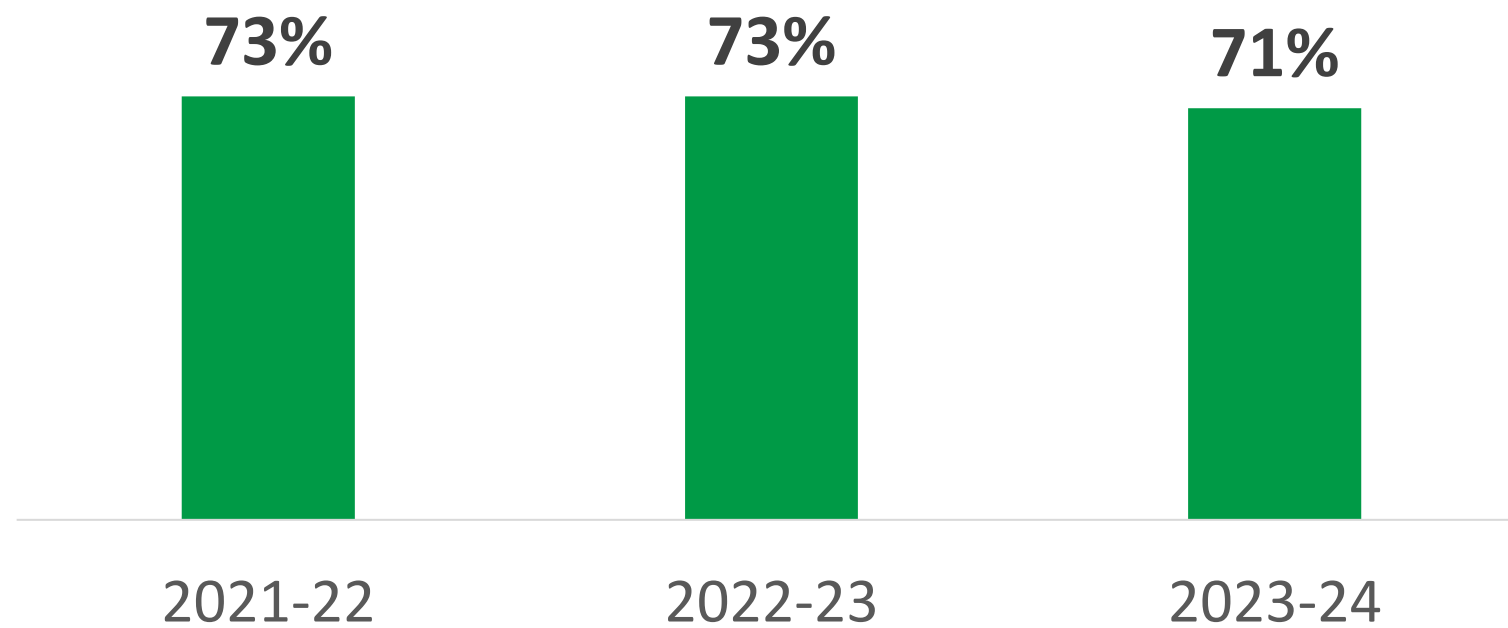
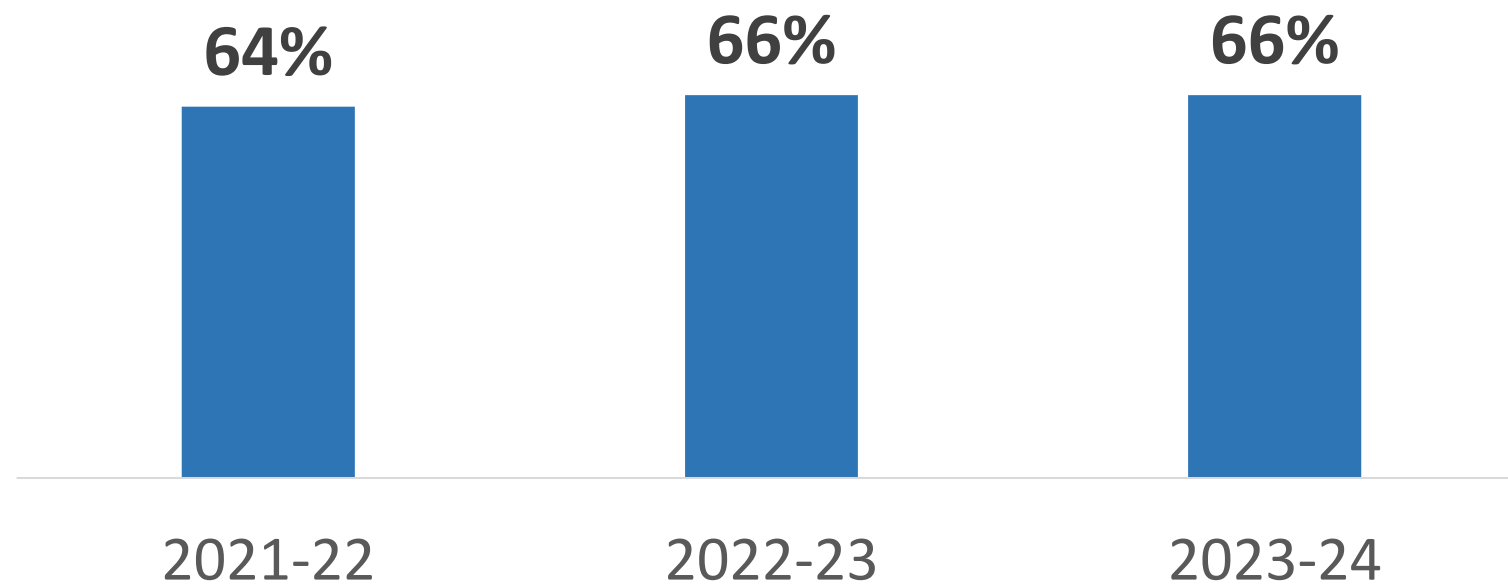

Percentage of Students at Provincial Standard in Reading



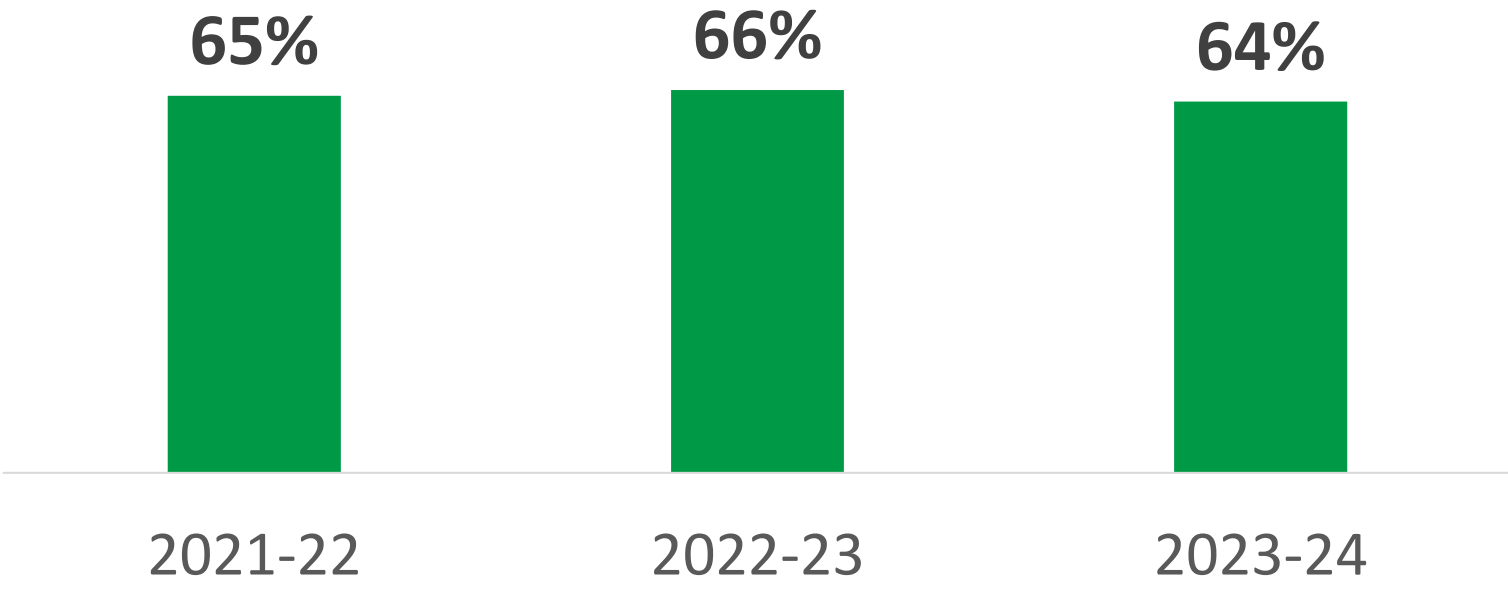
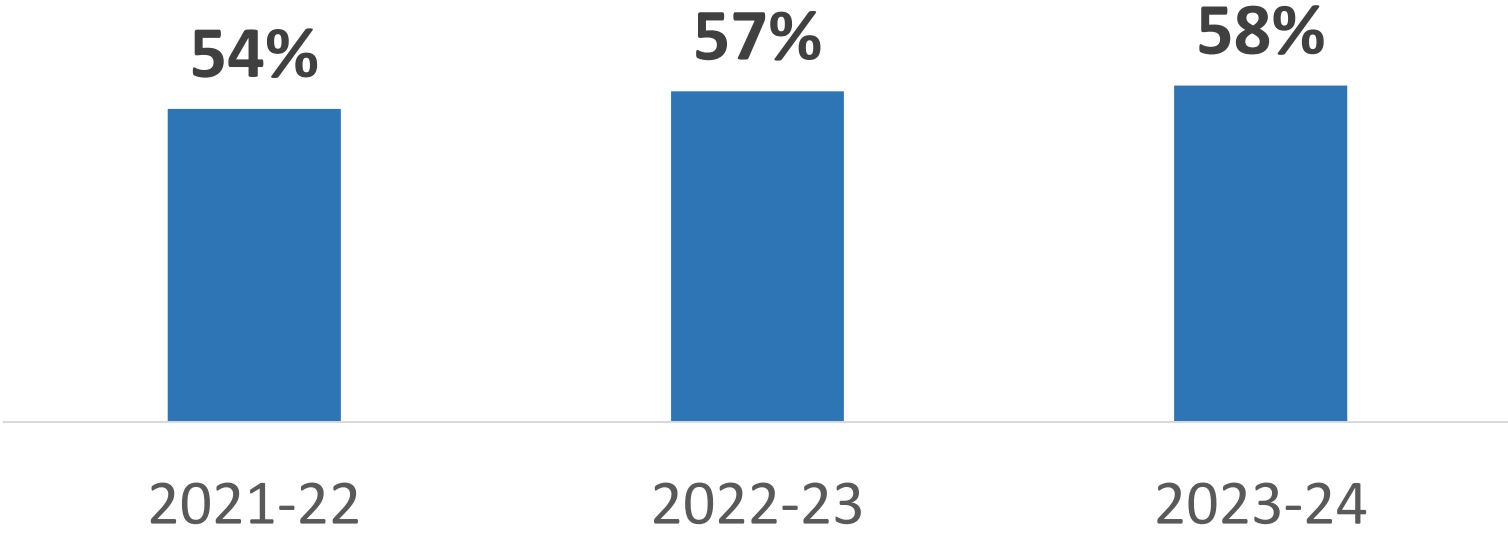

Percentage of Students at Provincial Standard in Writing



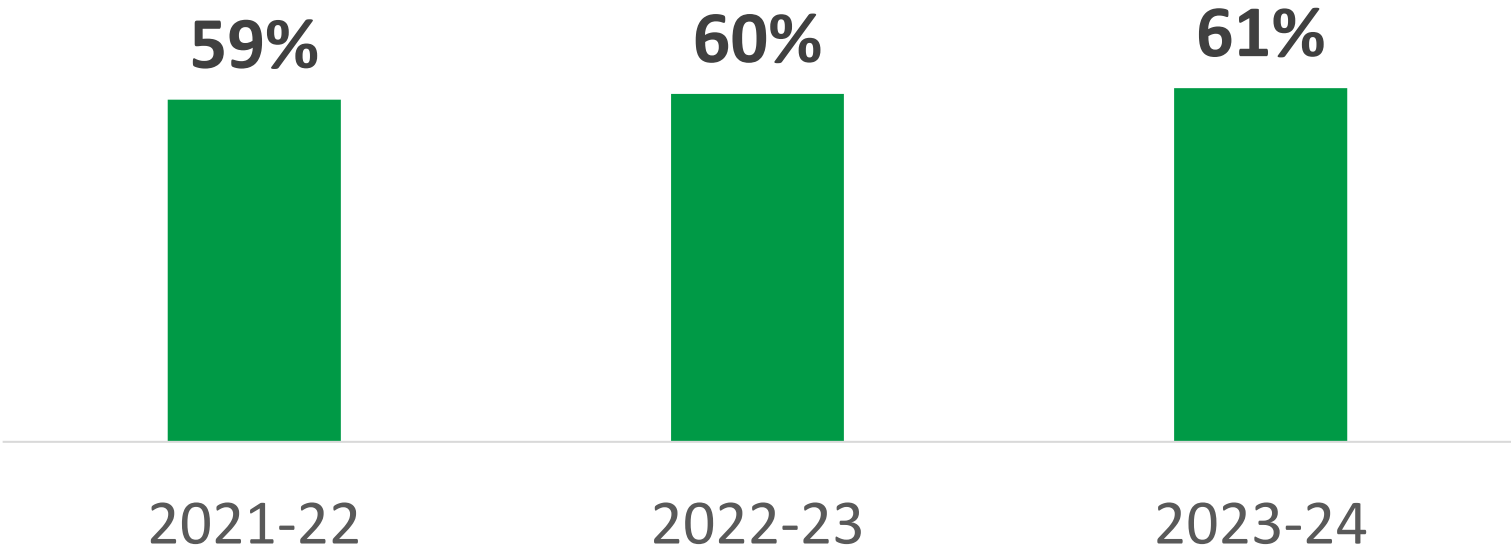
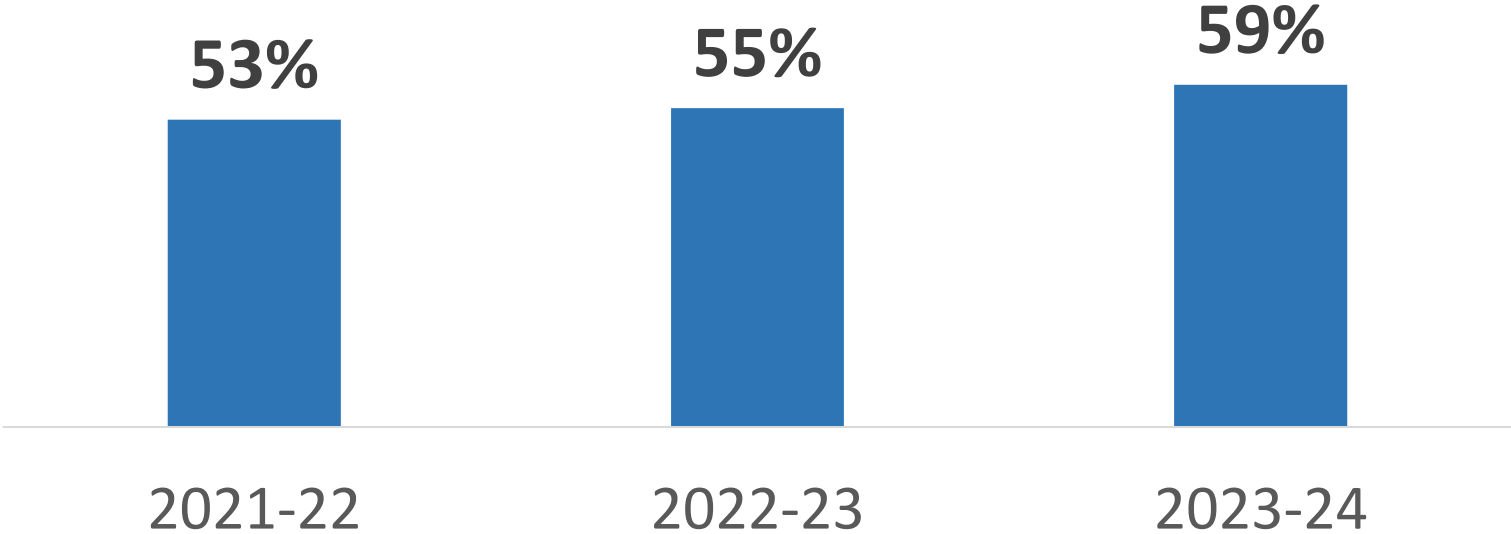

Percentage of Students at Provincial Standard in Reading



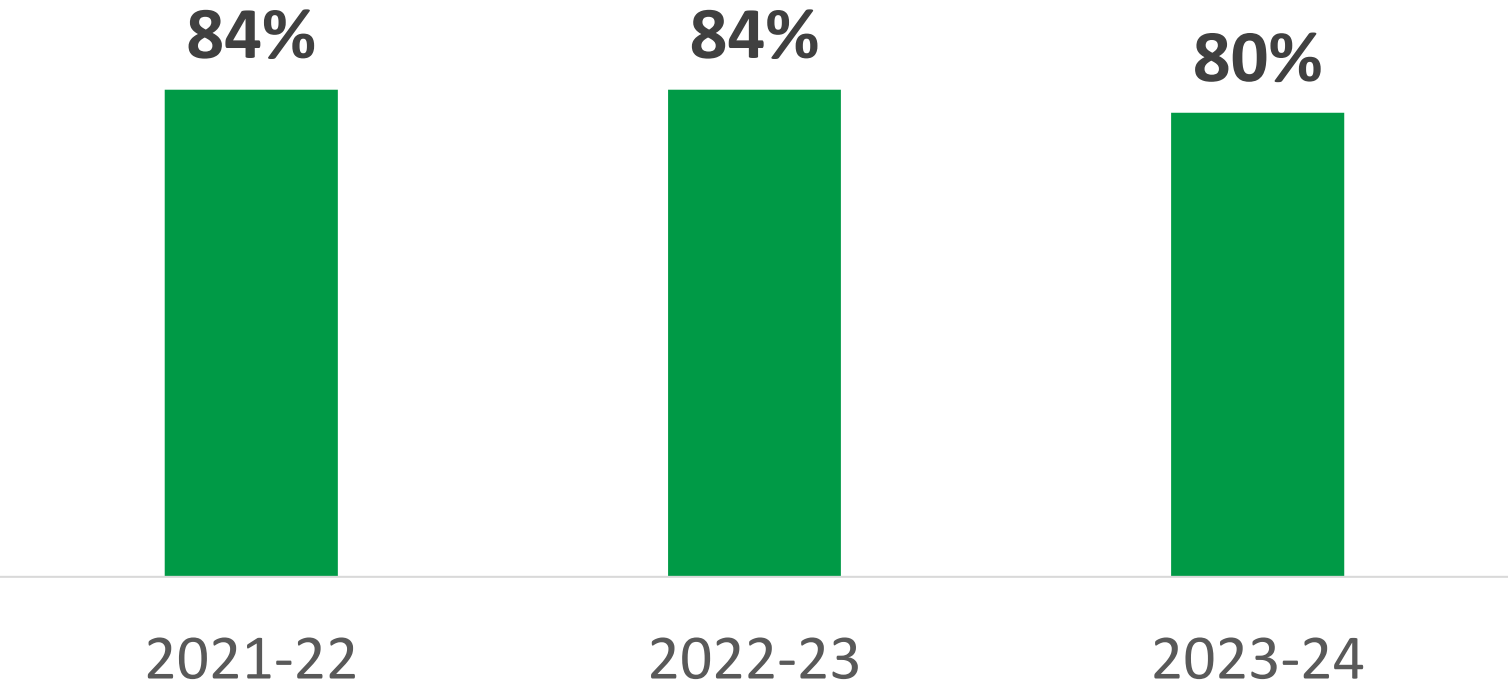
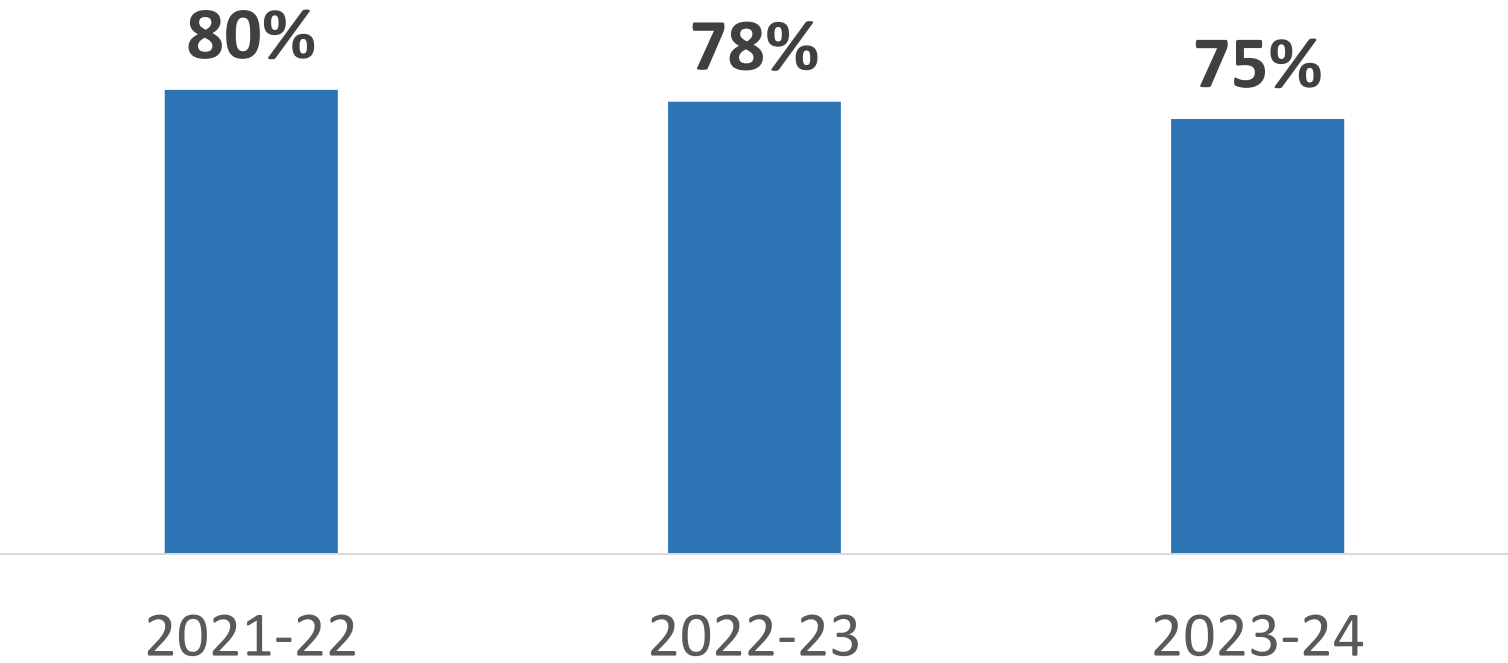

Percentage of Students at Provincial Standard in Writing



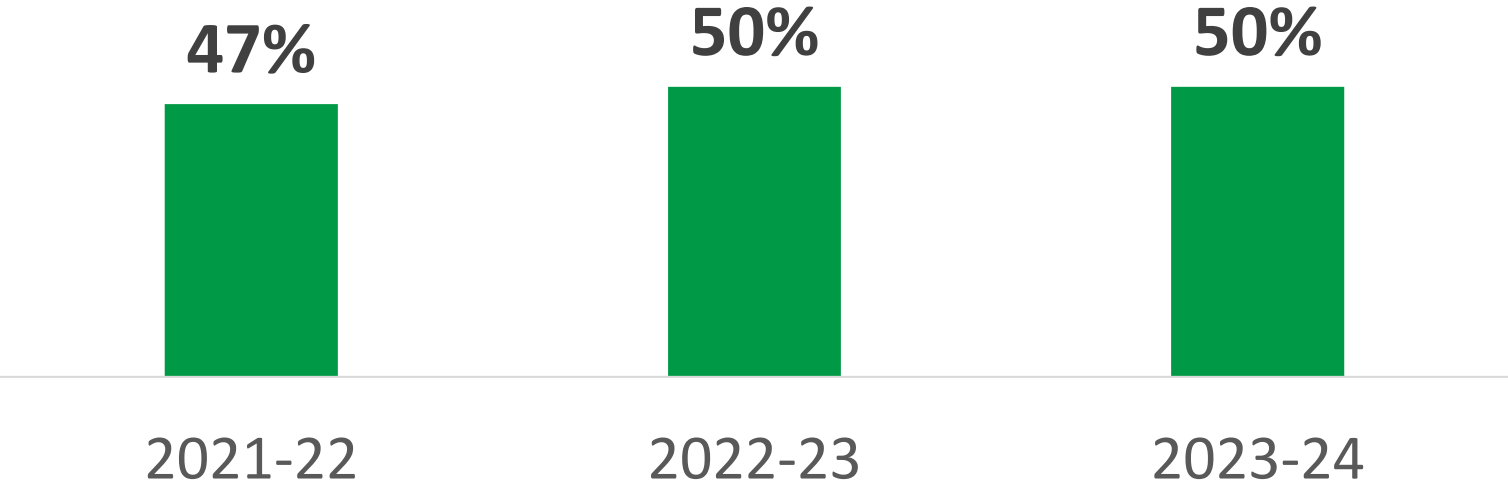
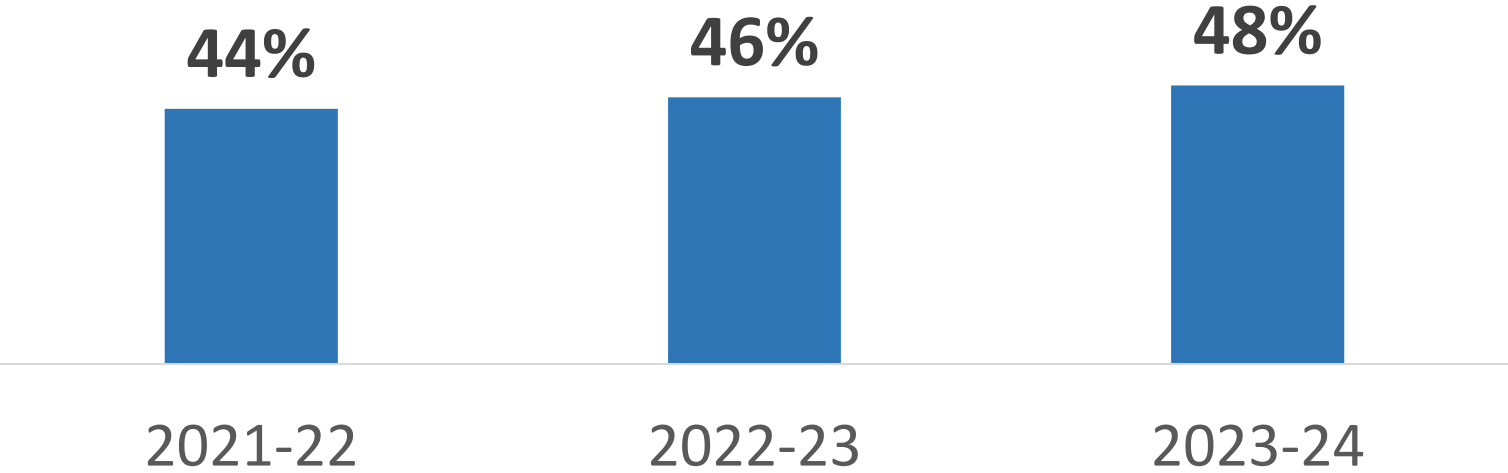

Grade 9 Math Assessment Results

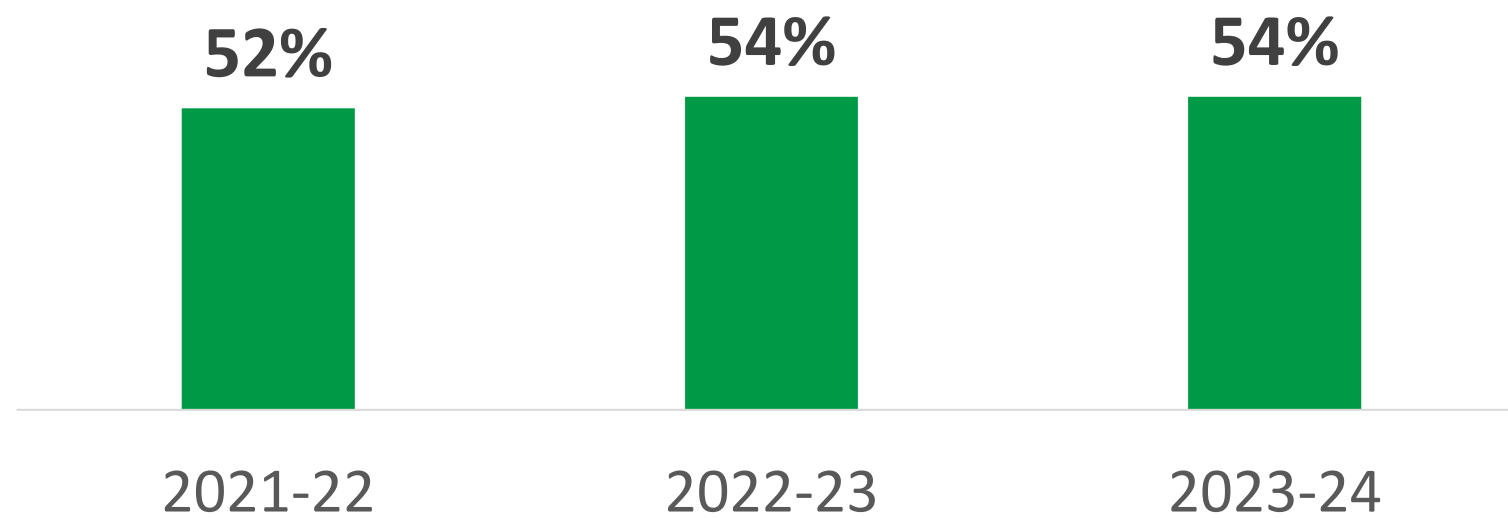
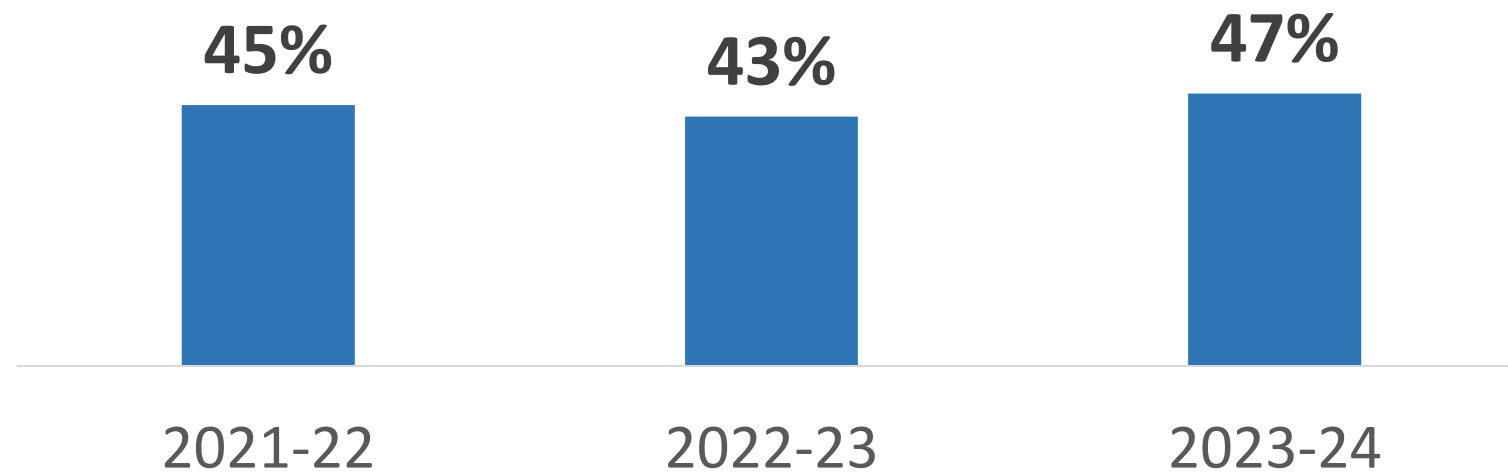

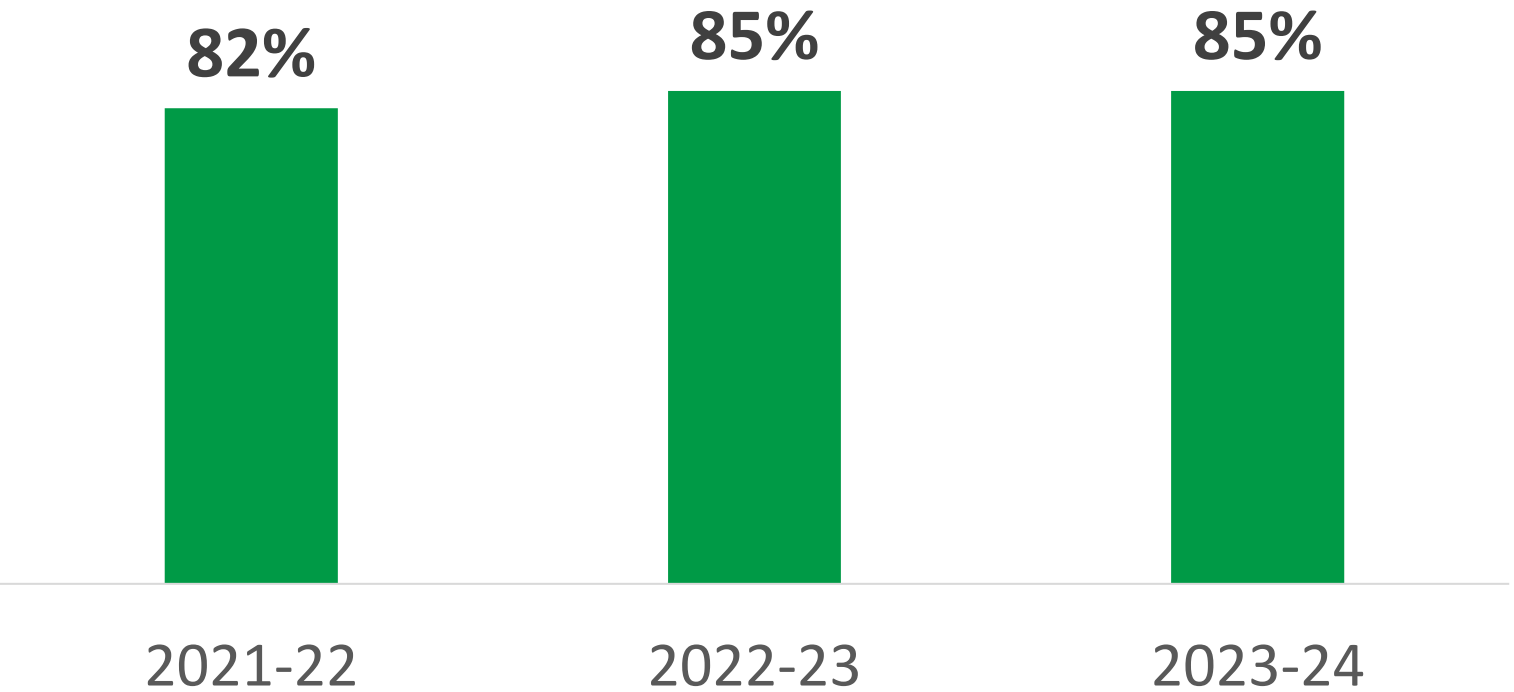
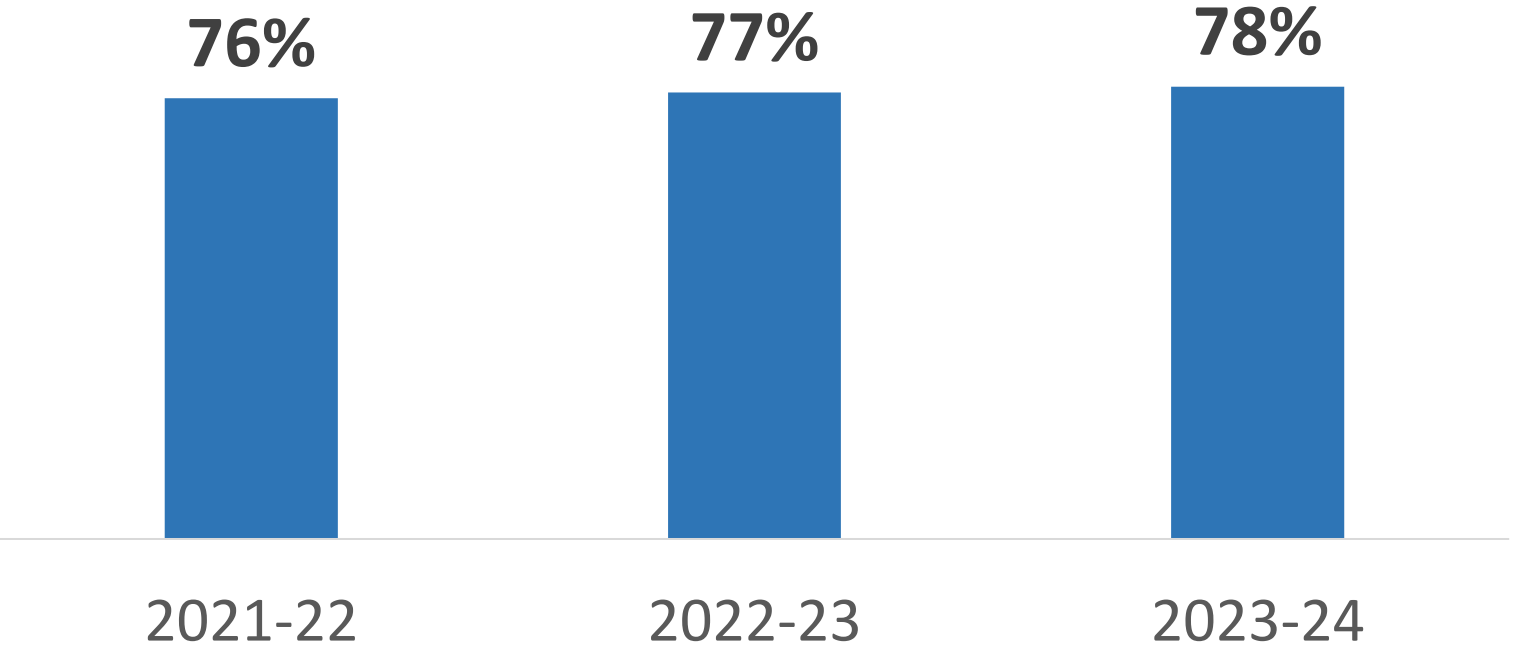


Grade 10 Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (FTE)

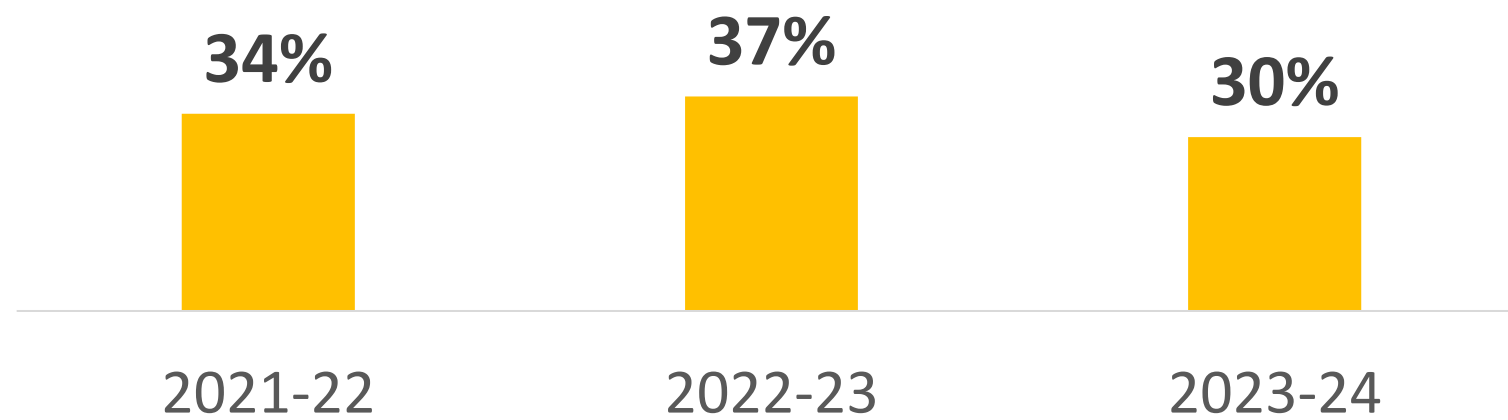

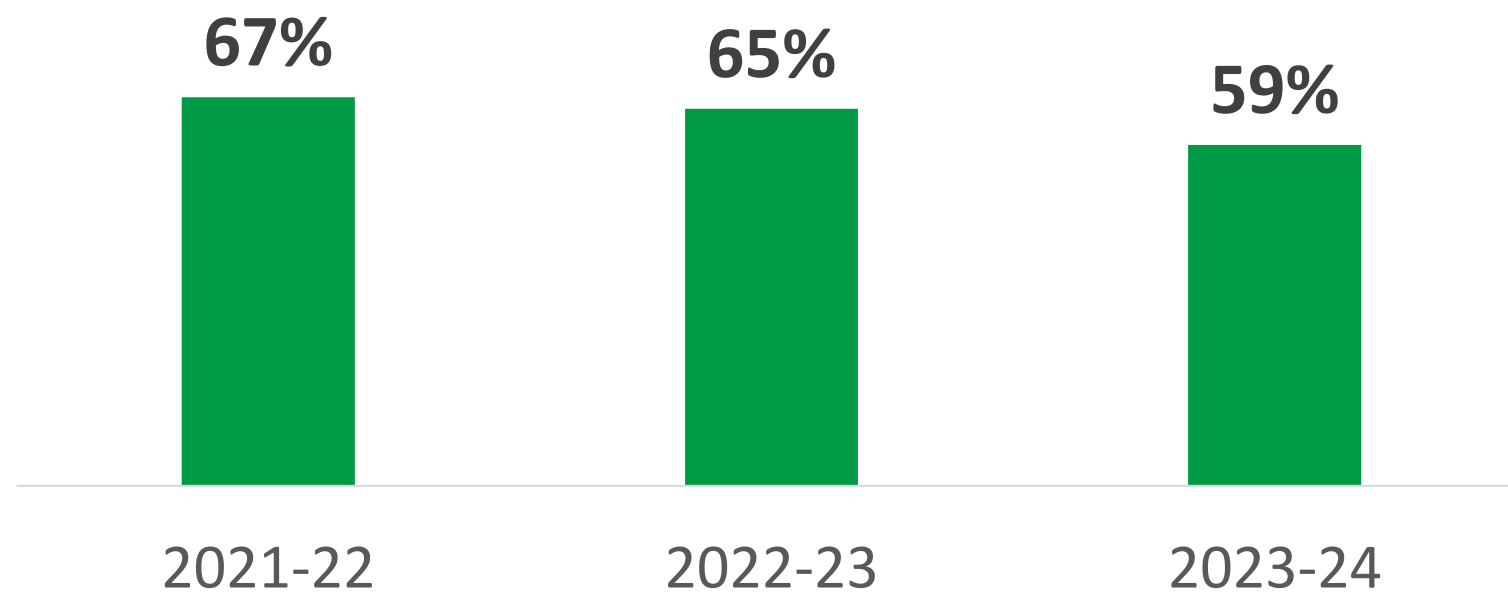
Percentage of **ML Students** at Provincial Standard in Grade 3 Reading

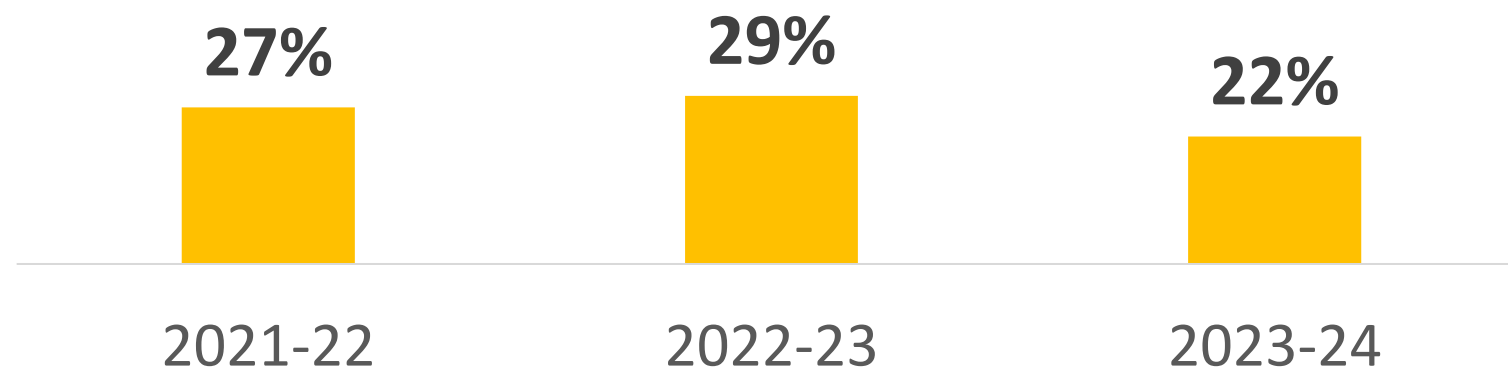

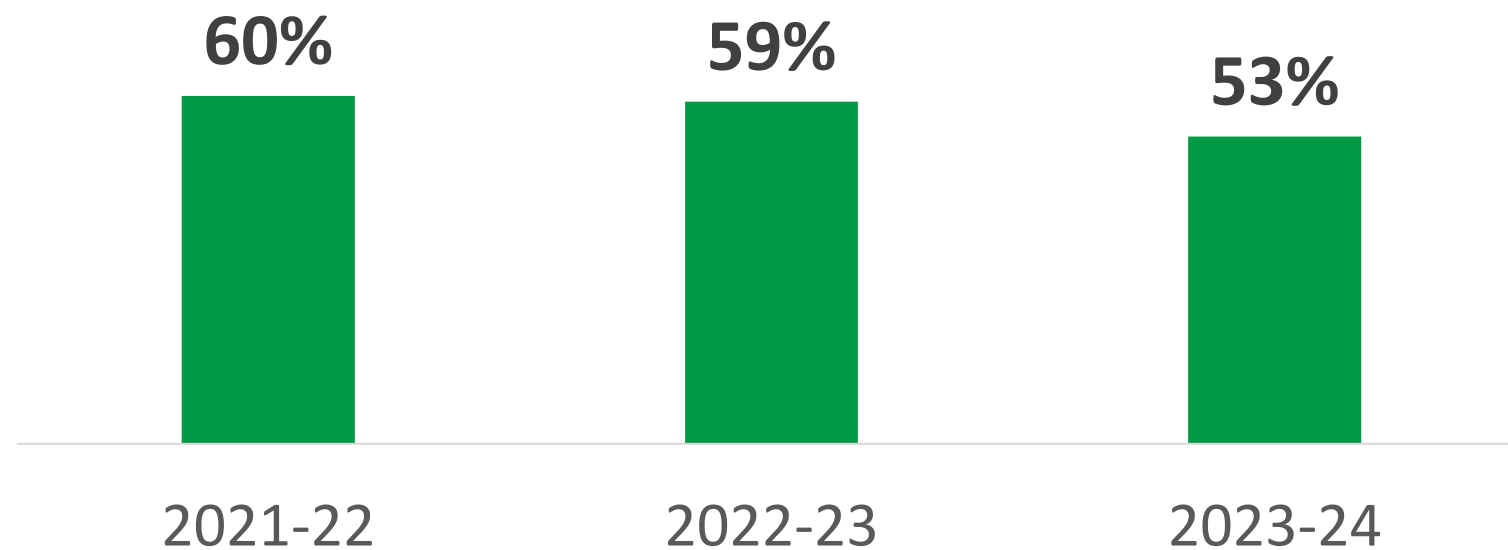
Percentage of **ML Students** at Provincial Standard in Grade 3 Writing

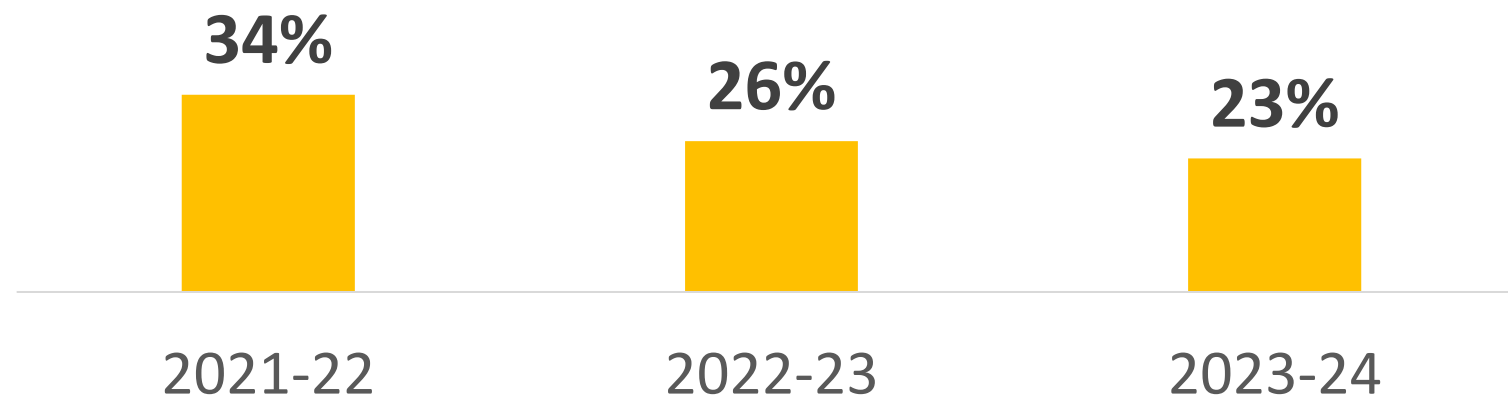

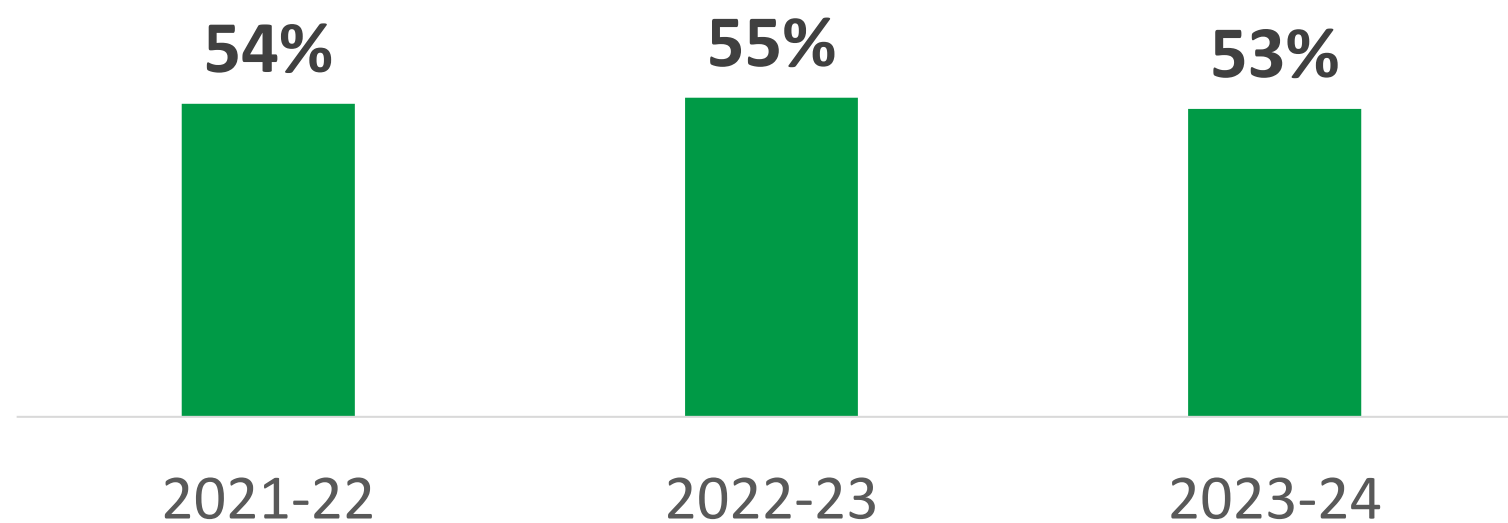
Percentage of **ML Students** at Provincial Standard in Grade 3 Math

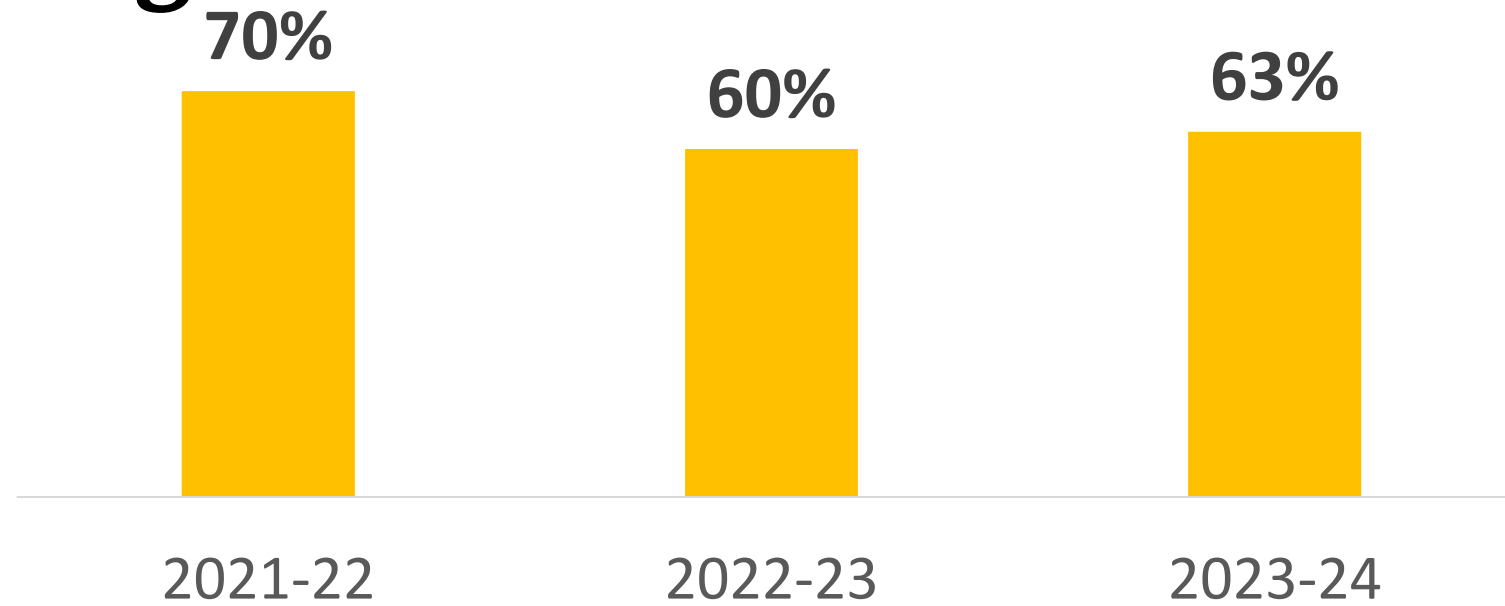

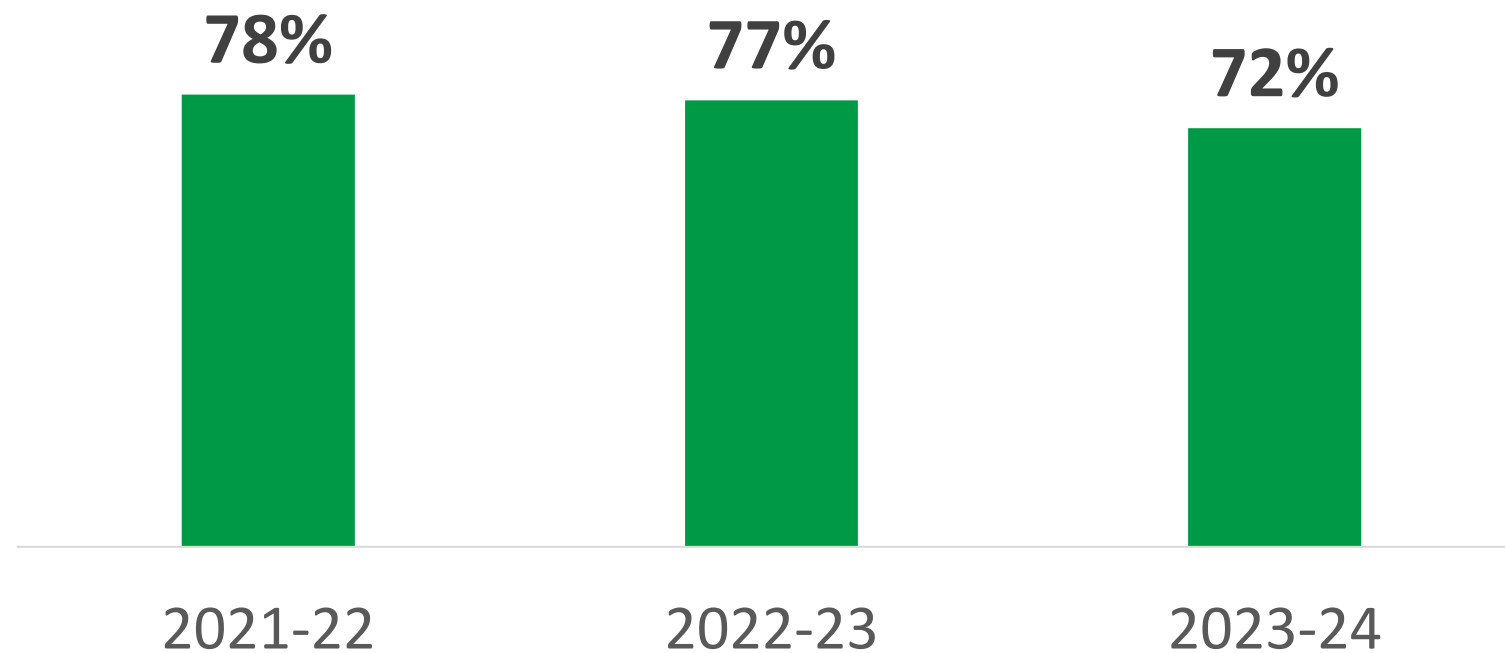
Percentage of **ML Students** at Provincial Standard in Grade 6 Reading

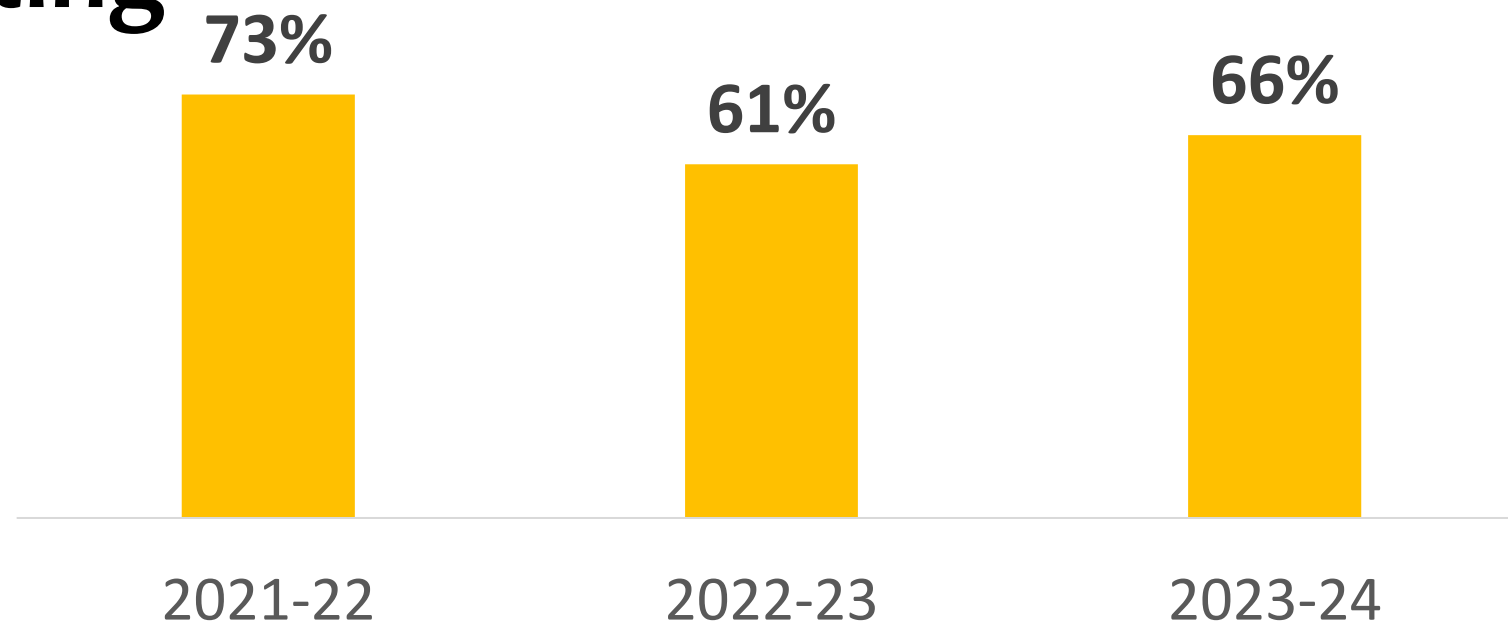

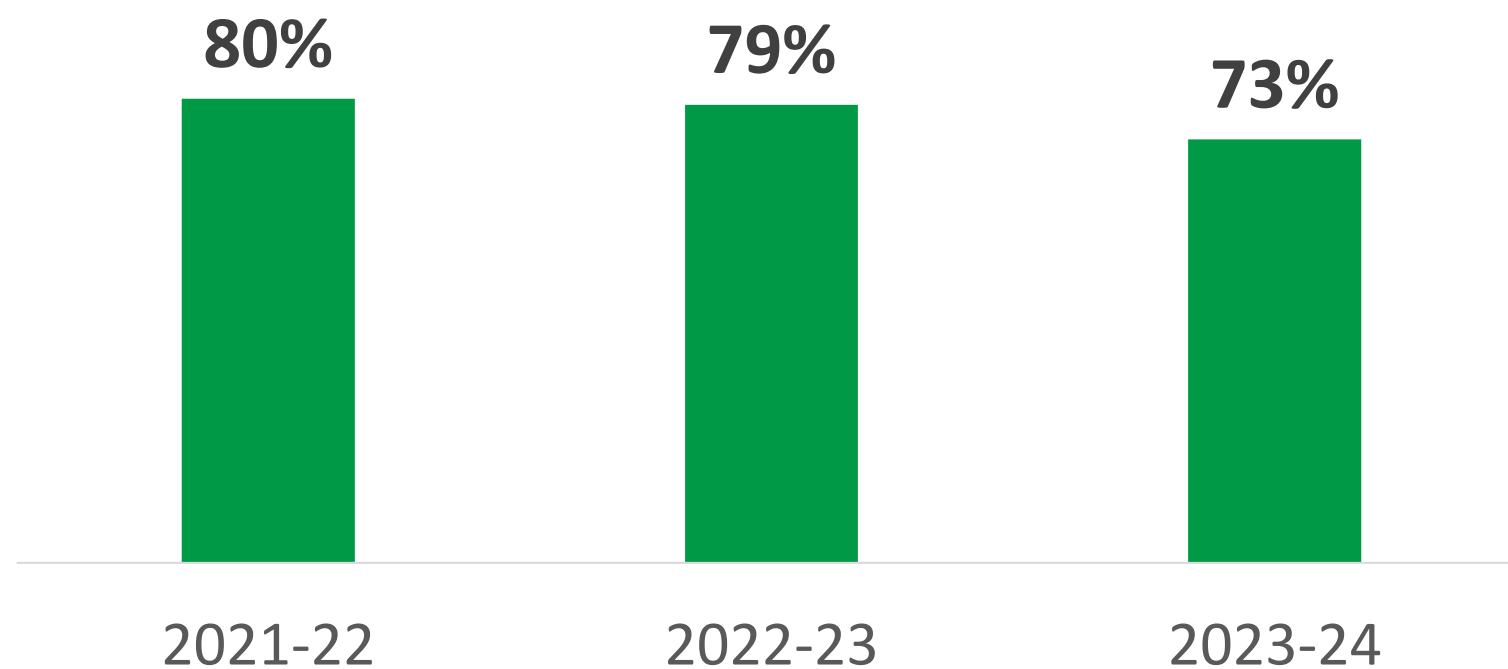
Percentage of **ML Students** at Provincial Standard in Grade 6 Writing

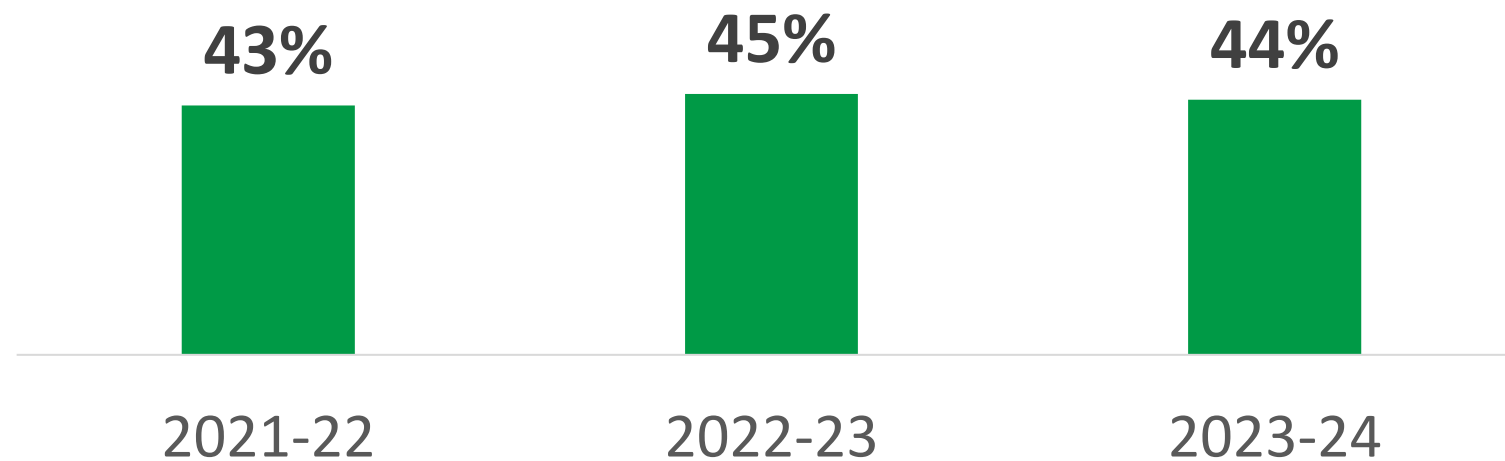
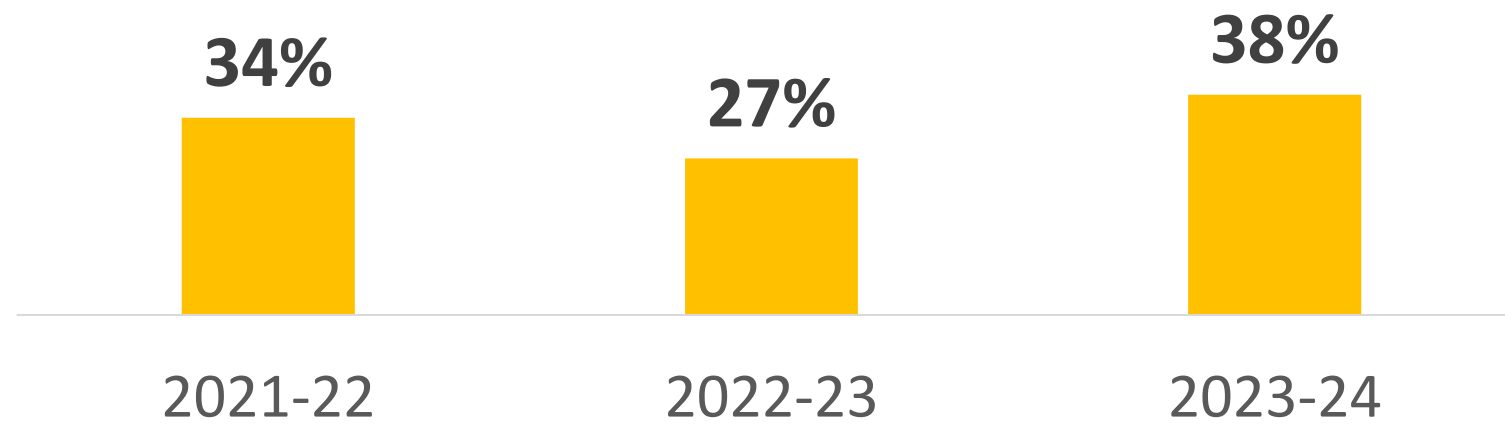

Percentage of **ML Students** at Provincial Standard in Grade 6 Math



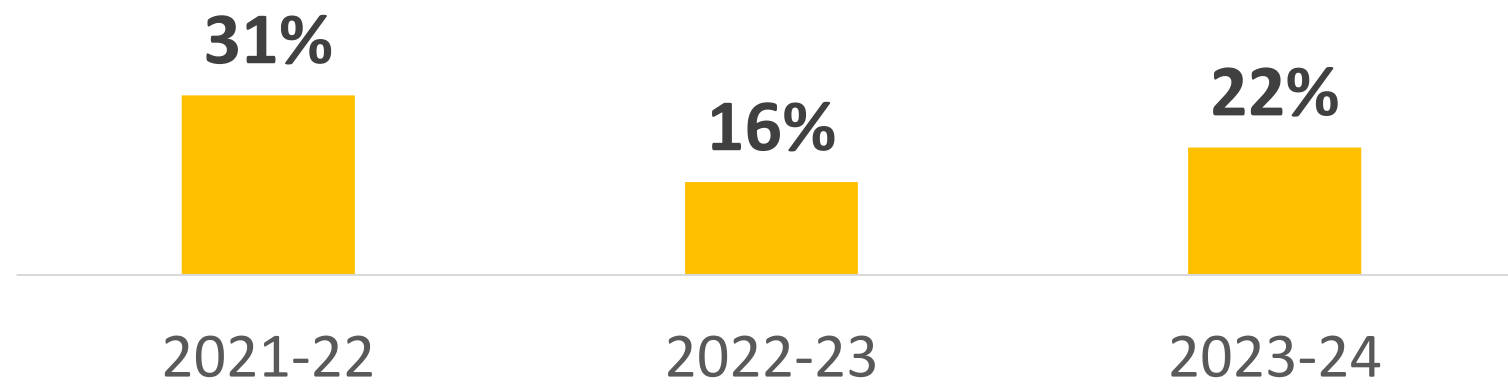

Percentage of **Students with an IEP** at Provincial Standard in Grade 3 Reading



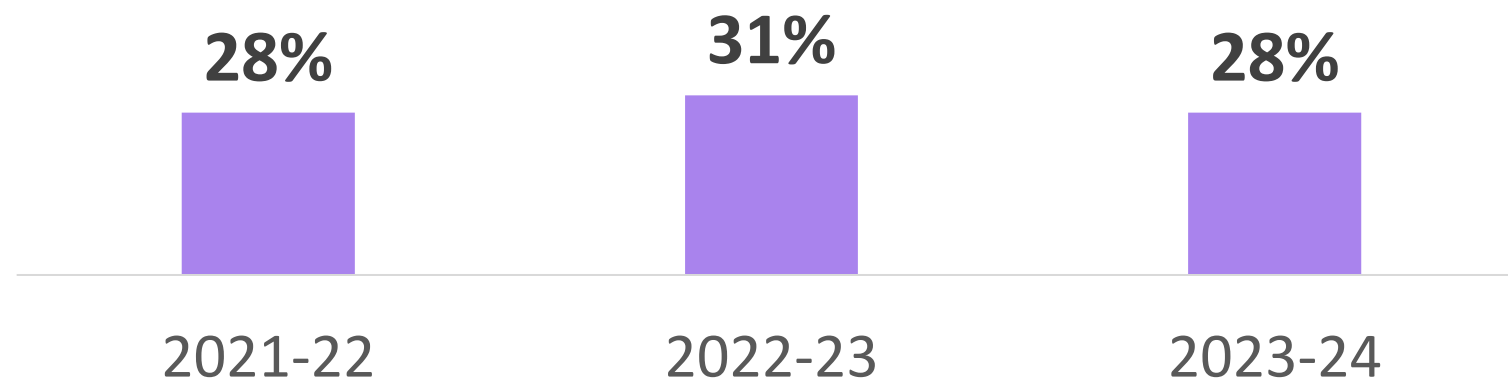

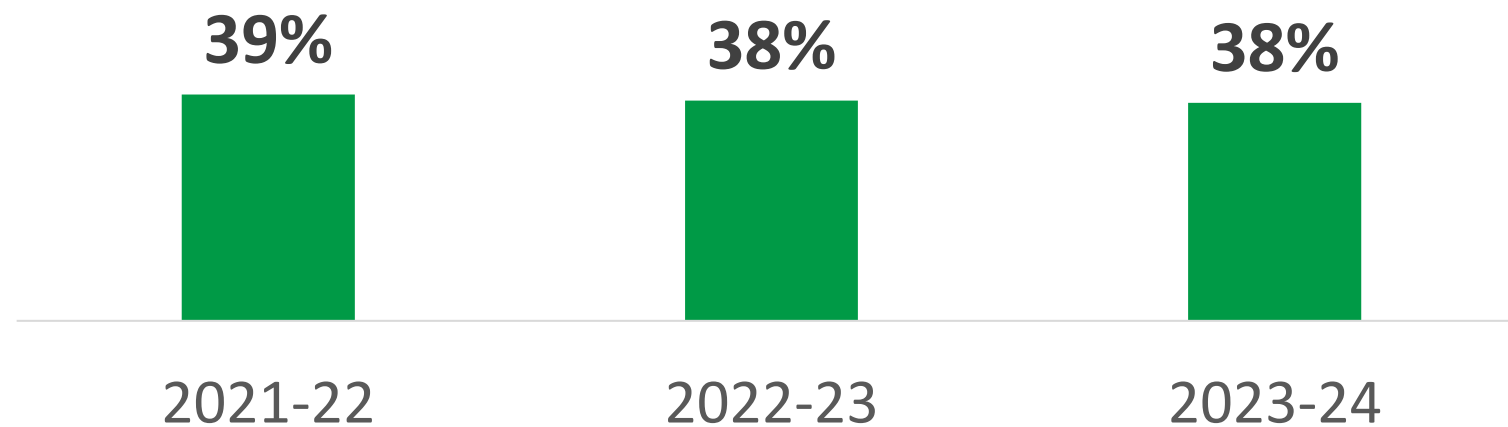
Percentage of **Students with an IEP** at Provincial Standard in Grade 3 Writing

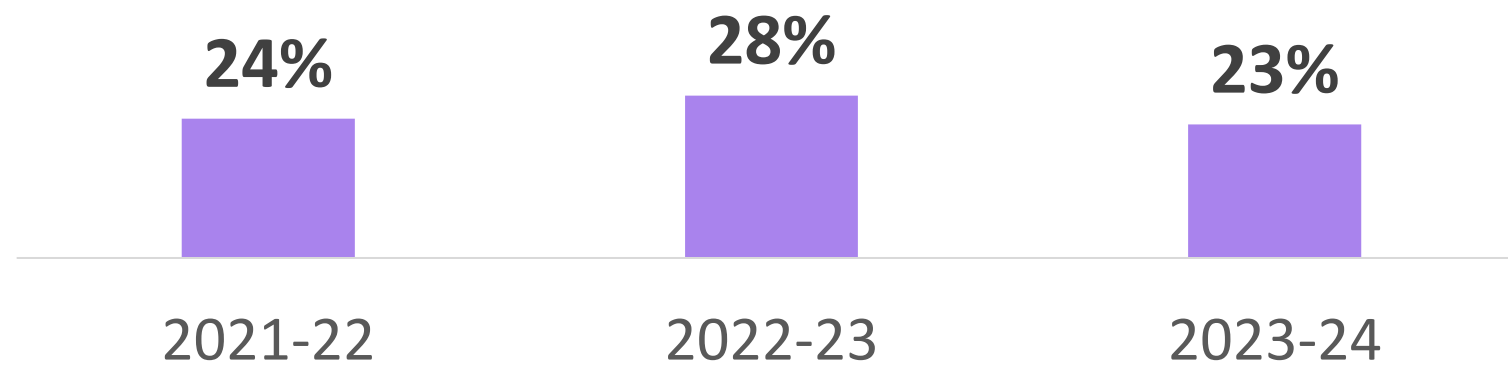

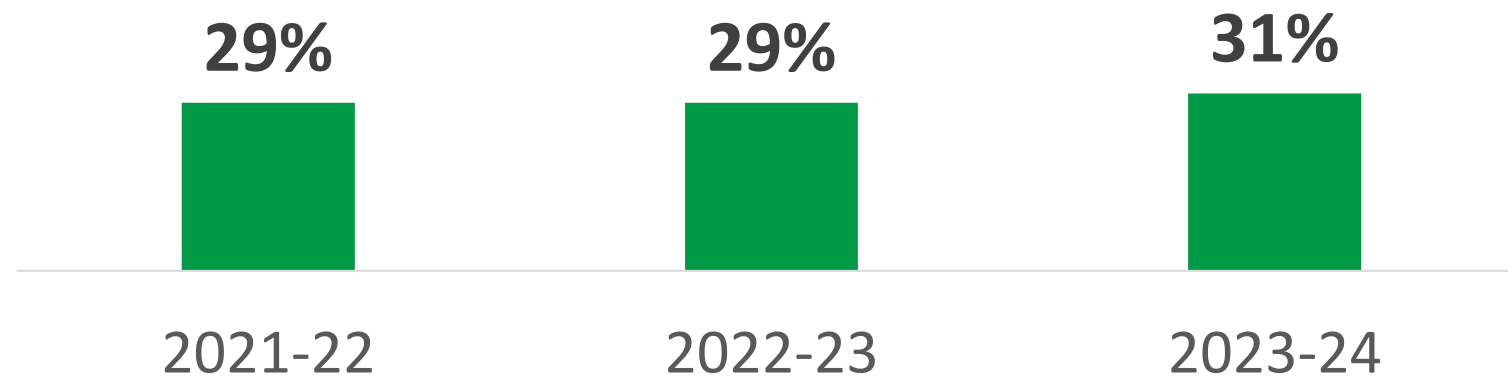
Percentage of **Students with an IEP** at Provincial Standard in Grade 3 Math

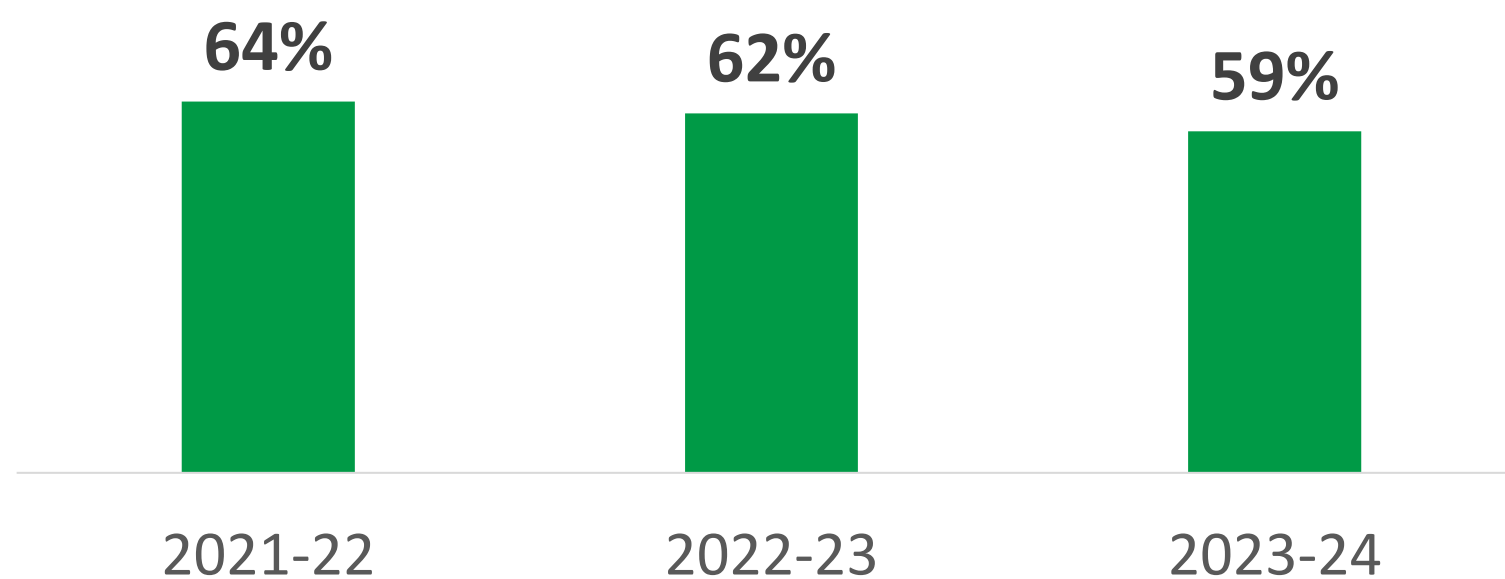
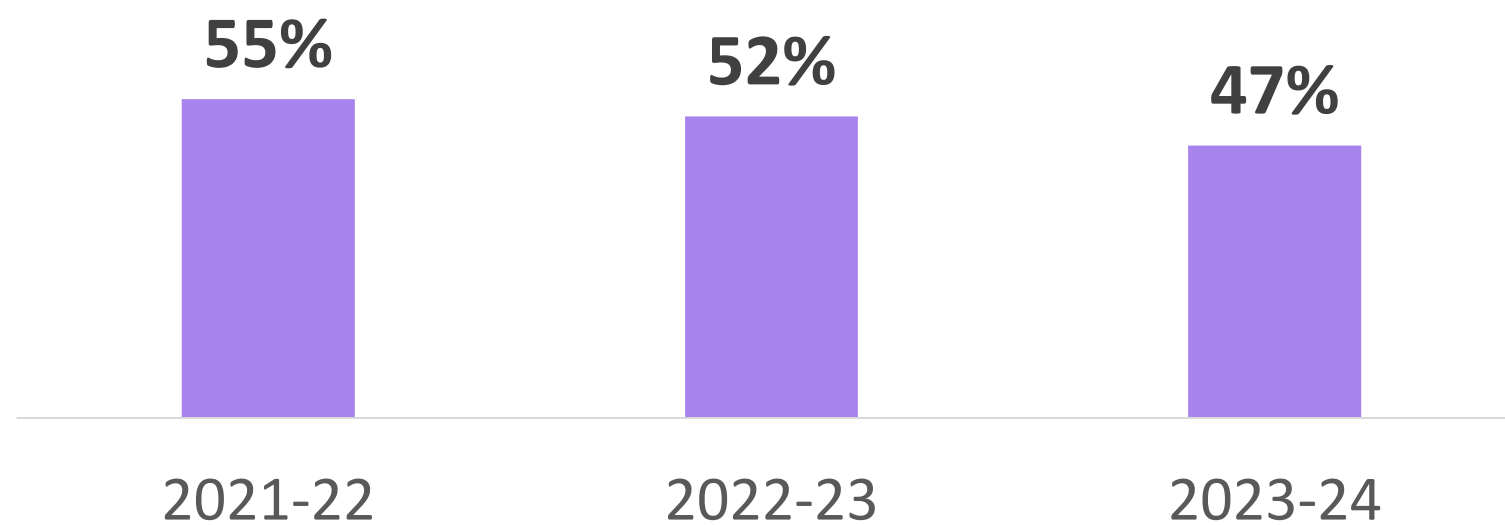

Percentage of **Students with an IEP** at Provincial Standard in Grade 6 Reading



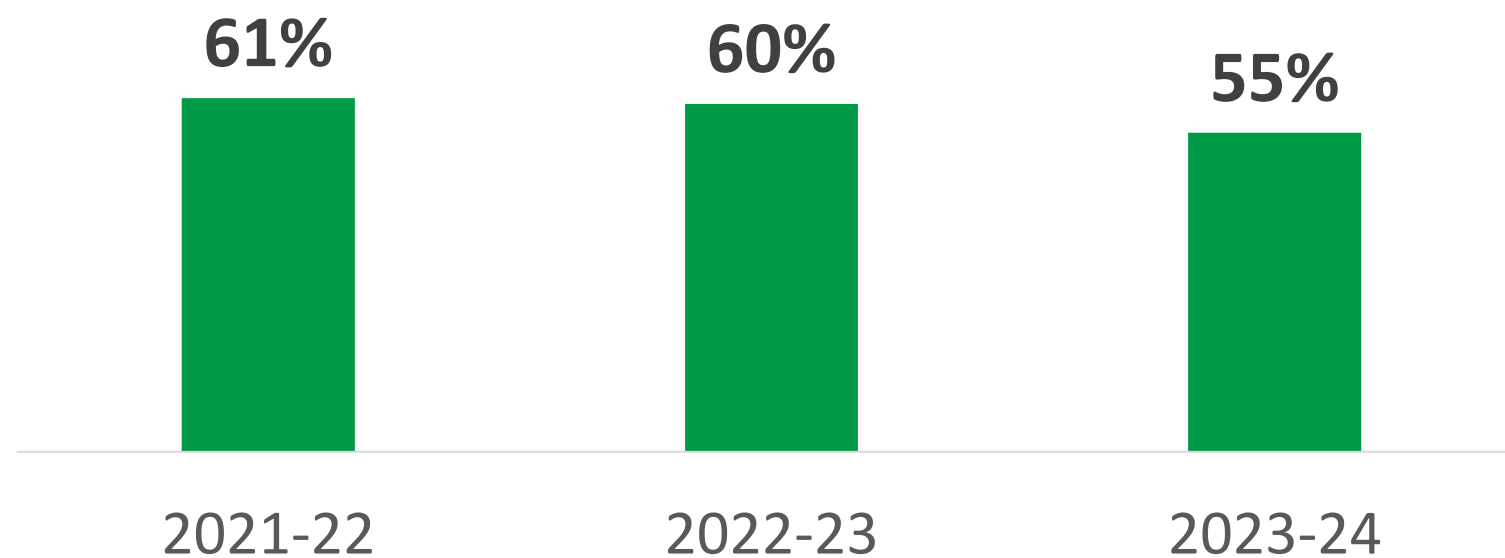
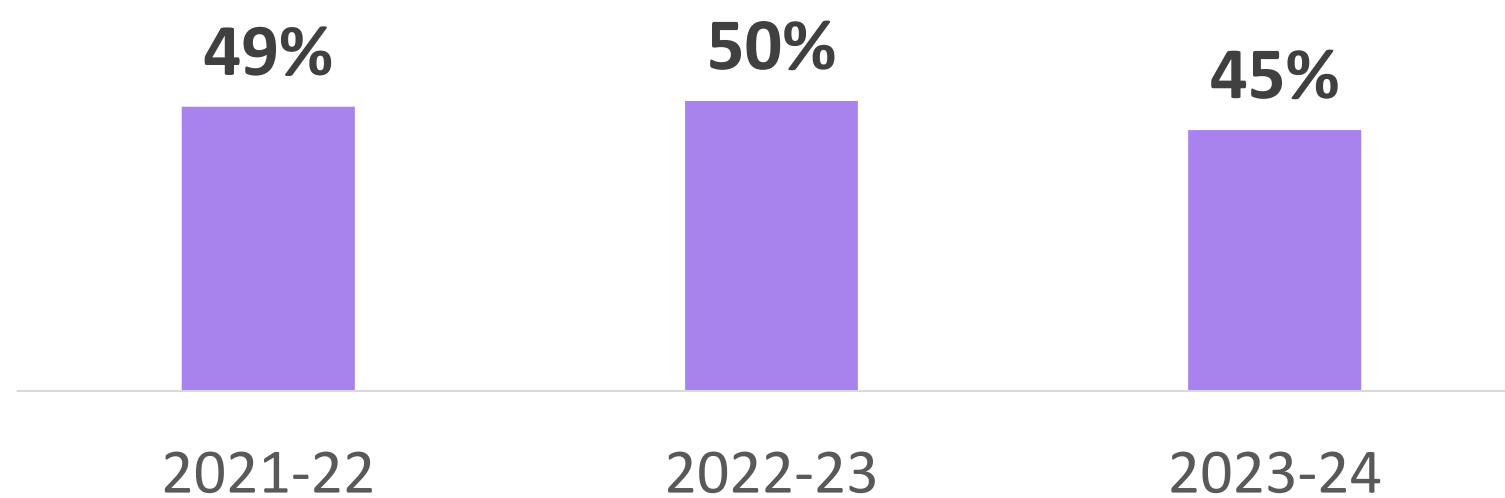

Percentage of **Students with an IEP** at Provincial Standard in Grade 6 Writing



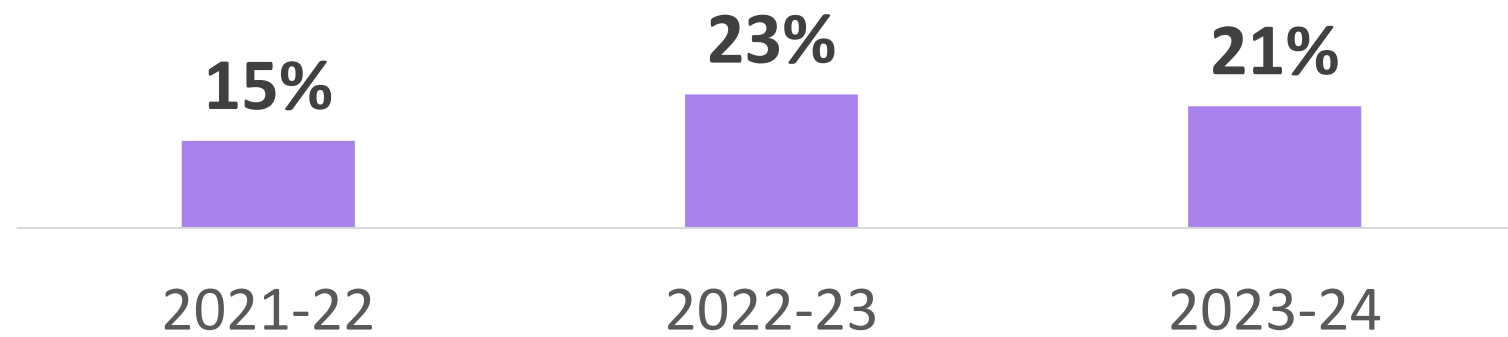

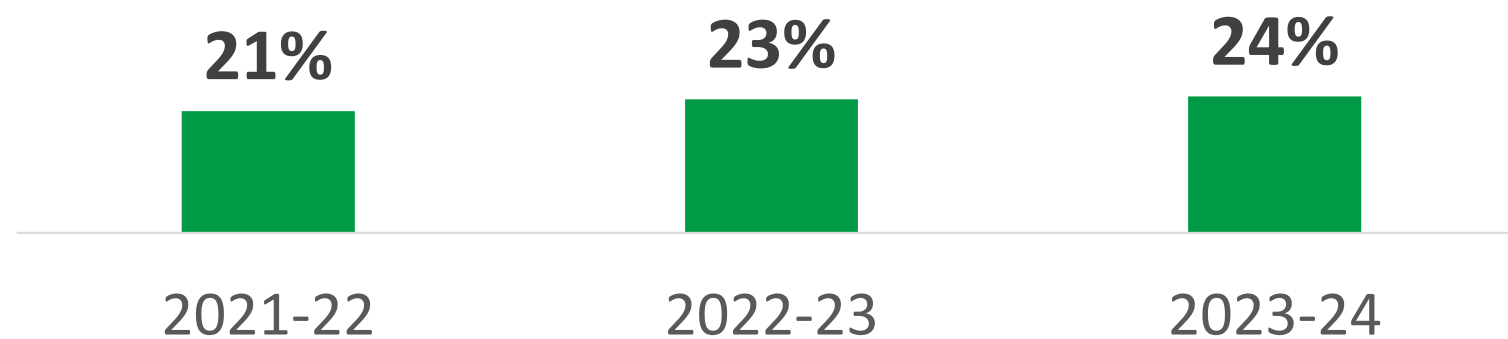
Percentage of **Students with an IEP** at Provincial Standard in Grade 6 Math

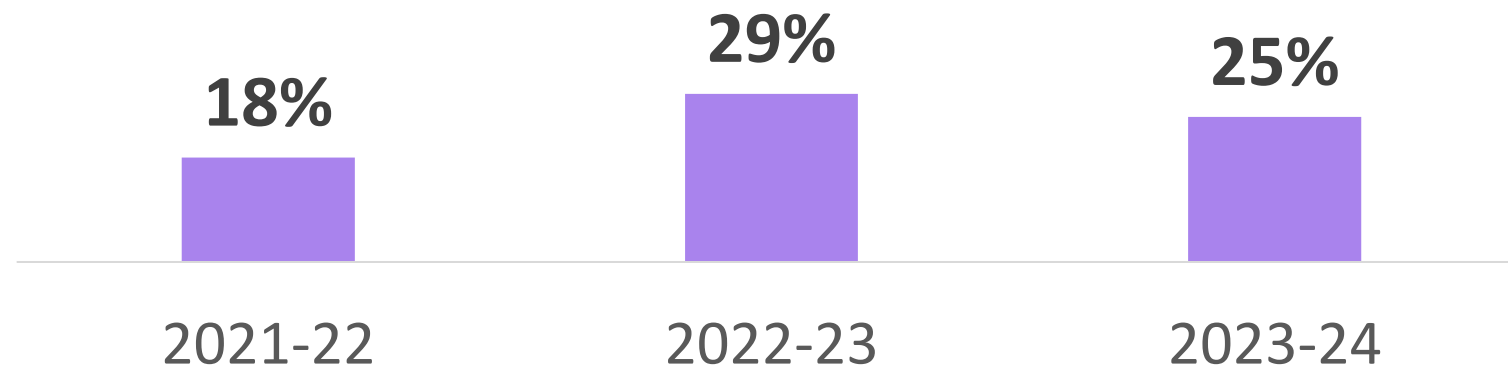

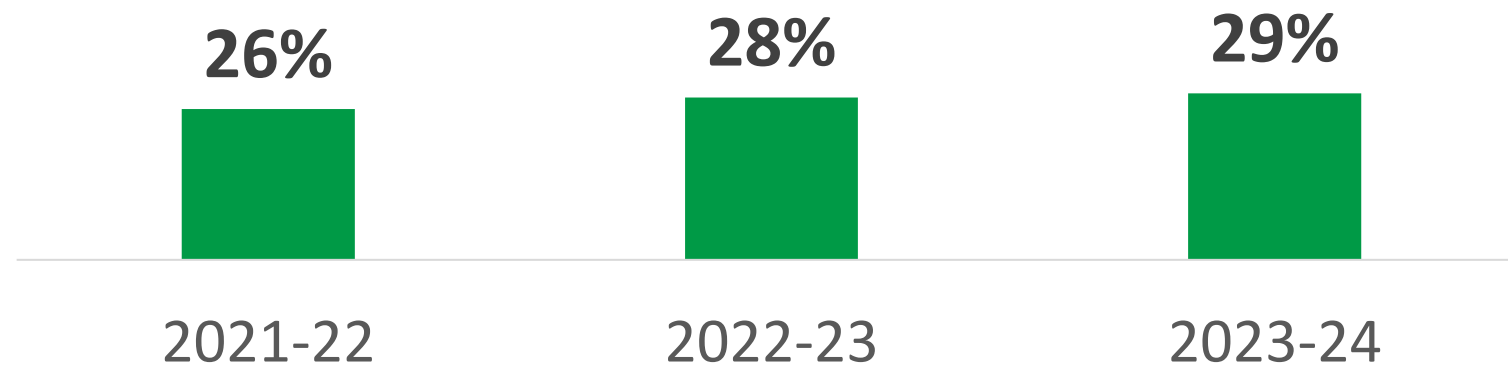
Percentage of **Students with an IEP** at Provincial Standard in Grade 9 Math

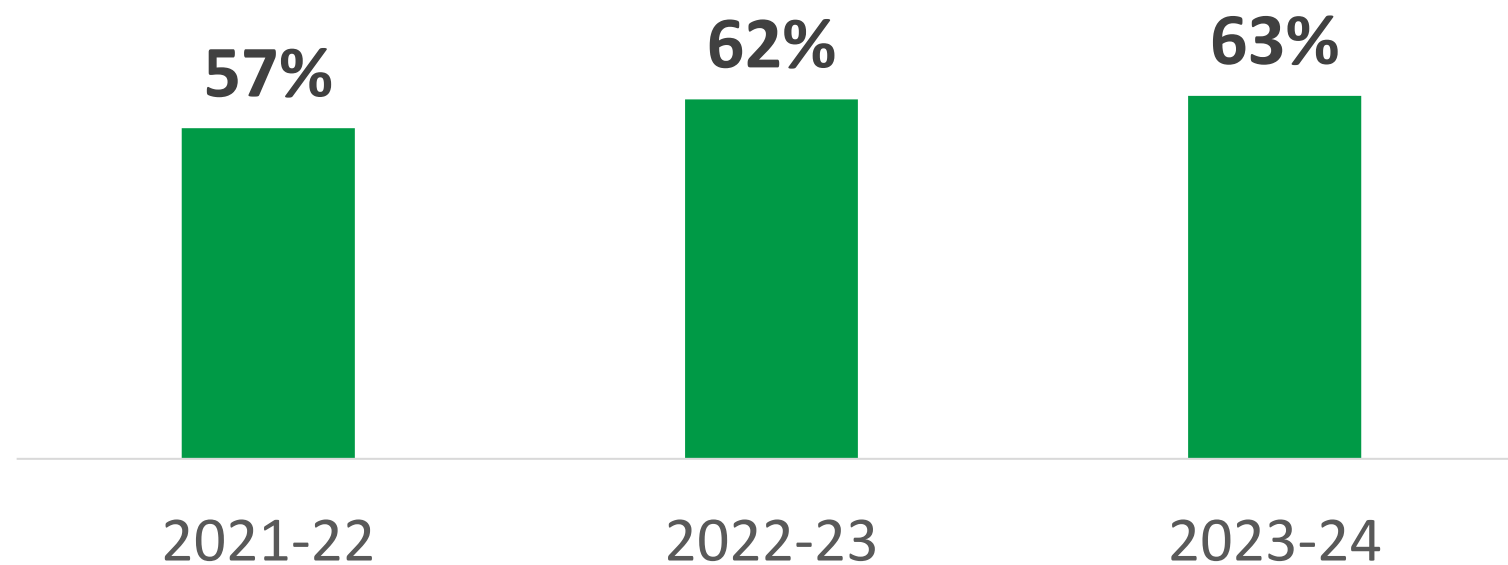
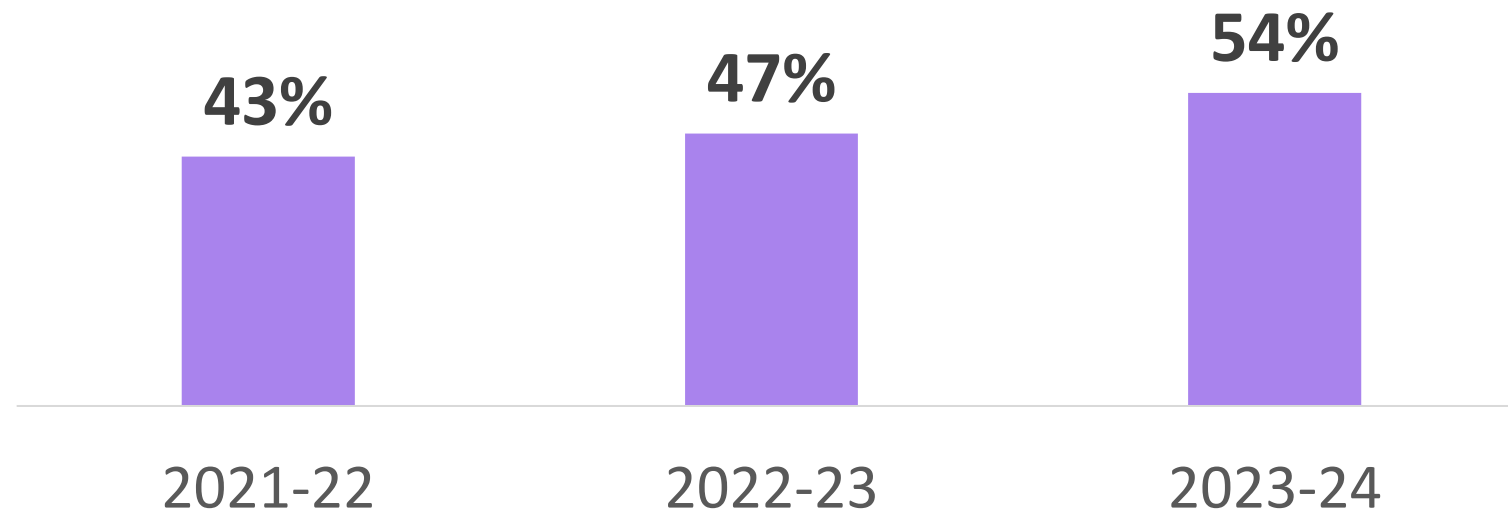
